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HISTORY

Founded in 1913, NCJW Dallas has pioneered ground-breaking programs addressing diverse needs in the Dallas community and beyond. The visionary women of NCJW Dallas have launched initiatives such as free school lunches, literacy services for English language learners and those with hearing or visual impairments, ASPIRE literacy instruction for adults, CASA, and volunteer support in public schools, among other.

AREAS OF IMPACT

- Families in Crisis: focused on abused women and children; clidren and youth aging out of foster care; and children testifying against abusers
- Education: early learning opportunities for preschoolers; teacher support; and college scholarships
- Health and Wellness: women's access to health care; access to healthy food; and nutrition and fitness education

IMPACT PROGRAMS

- THE SUITCASE PROJECT: Provides essential transitional assistance to abuse survivors and children aging out of foster care.
- → Annually assists > 400 FAMILIES IN CRISIS.
- THE WEST DALLAS INITIATIVE: Multi-partner program provides essential food and necessities (such as diapers) to West Dallas families and direct support to elementary students and school staff to ensure quality education.
- → Annually assists > 6000 INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES.
- HOME INSTRUCTION FOR PARENTS OF PRE-SCHOOL

YOUTH (HIPPY): Promotes early education support to HIPPY preschoolers and their families. Awards college scholarships to HIPPY high school graduates.

- → Annually supports 4300 STUDENTS & THEIR FAMILIES.
- KIDS IN COURT: A 30-year-old award-winning initiative that introduces the trial process to child abuse victims, witnesses, and their families.
- → Annually supports > 450 INDIVIDUALS.
- FOOD FIT = FUN: Demonstrates and teaches how a healthy lifestyle is affordable, achievable, and enjoyable by combining nutrition classes with physical activity in a fun environment.
- → Annually educates > 1200 NEIGHBORS.
- THE VICKERY MEADOW FOOD PANTRY: Provides food, clothing and other necessities to a community of thousands of immigrants and refugees.
- → Annually distributes > 40,000 lb OF FOOD.
